Circuit-by-Circuit Roundup PRCA Money Breakdown



COVID-19 took a serious toll on the rodeo world. Here's how it affected each circuit in the PRCA. —By Chelsea Shaffer

Even before the NFR move, Texas was the place to rodeo in 2020, paying \$6,900,881 at its 59 circuit rodeos this year—some \$4 million more than any other circuit in the PRCA.

(Editor's Note: Money does not include barrel racing or breakaway roping payouts.)

Of course, Texas was still able to host its major winter rodeos pre-COVID-19—including most of RodeoHouston, San Antonio's Stock Show and Rodeo, and Forth Worth's Stock Show and Rodeo. But it also held many of its smaller PRCA rodeos, like Stephenville's Cowboy Capital of the World PRCA Rodeo with its \$83,762 payout, Weatherford's Parker County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo with its \$129,080 payout, and its weekly Mesquite Championship Rodeo with its varied payouts.

GREAT LAKES STANDOUTS **RAHLMANN AND VONAHN** CROWNED RNCFR TEAM ROPING CHAMPS

At the rescheduled and relocated Ram National Circuit Finals Rodeo, 2019 circuit champions and circuit average winners went head-to-head over two go-rounds, with the top eight finishers in the average progressing to a Sunday semifinal round, followed by a finals, Sept. 10–13, 2020, in Greeley, Colorado.



It didn't happen the way they planned, but 2020 Resistol Rookie contender Coy Rahlmann and veteran horseman Ryan VonAhn took home \$7,922 per man and \$20,000 Ram Truck vouchers at the Ram National Circuit Finals Rodeo, held in Greeley, Colorado.

After the first team in the final round took a no-time, Rahlmann and Von Ahn took a plus-5 on their short-round steer for 11.1 seconds. Frustrated, they watched as the Mexican Circuit team of Bandis Guiterrez and Orlando Jauregui got a barrier and a leg. Then, the California circuit team of Jr. Dees and Nano Garza got a leg, too.

"I didn't know how it would end up," Rahlmann, just 19, said. "But it just kind of fell apart. It was a shocker to everybody and it went our way."

VonAhn, who's 32 and qualified for three previous RNCFRs on the head side, was in disbelief.

"One of the committee men said I'd need to run over and get ready to get in the truck if the final team messed up," VonAhn said. "I said, 'Don't worry, that ain't happening.' But it fell our way, and it was unbelievable."

Rahlmann and VonAhn finished third in the semifinal round, after Rahlmann struggled to get tight.

"My horse has been a little sore the last couple times I got him out," said Rahlmann, who finished the 2020 ProRodeo season with \$8,981.14 won on the year and finished third in the Resistol Rookie race. "He kind of got hung up and wouldn't face and climbed up the wall the wrong way. I think it cost us from probably winning the round. We still won third and got some money for that."

That's unusual from Charlie, Rahlmann's go-to, 10-year-old mount.

"I went and changed some bits and kind of did some stuff to get to pulling around a little better," Rahlmann said. "Hancock is about the only thing he's got on his papers that I know. He's just a diamond in the rough."

VonAhn was on a 7-year-old gelding named Simple that he bought from his brother—twotime World Champion Kollin VonAhn.

"I just got him over the Fourth of July," VonAhn said. "He'd rode him at some of the bigger ropings and thought that's what I needed."

VonAhn will winter in Arizona getting horses ready for the Hershberger Performance Horse Sale in Queen Creek, while Rahlmann will return to Cisco Junior College in Cisco, Texas, where he's college rodeoing with Kirby Blankenship. He plans to rodeo with BFI Champion Lane Siggins at the winter rodeos.

The win is a big one for Rahlmann, who grew up roping with his dad, Chris, in the USTRC and watching his mom, Susie, running barrels.

"My parents are some of the biggest reasons I do what I do," Rahlmann said. "When I got old enough to be on a bigger scale, they pitched the reins to me and said, 'It's all yours!"

While Rahlmann has NFR goals, VonAhn is looking to keep on in the Great Lakes Circuit.

"I really like the Great Lakes Circuit," VonAhn laughed. "Thirty rodeos is plenty for me. I love Wisconsin, Minnesota, Missouri, Iowa."

The RNCFR—originally slated for April 2020 in Kissimmee—moved to Greeley's outdoor venue after the COVID-19 shutdown prohibited organizers from holding the event indoors. This year's RNCFR earnings do not count toward any other standings. They will count once more for the 2021 standings. ■

MINOR BROTHERS CONTINUE COMEBACK WITH COLUMBIA RIVER CIRCUIT FINALS AVERAGE WIN

Riley and Brady Minor pocketed \$4,034.84 a man that counts toward the 2021 PRCA world standings.



Brothers Riley and Brady Minor bounced back from a regular season mired by bad luck to win the Columbia River Circuit Finals in Hermiston, Oregon, worth \$4,034.84 a man plus a spot at the Kissimmee, Florida Ram National Circuit Finals in April 2021.

The Ellensburg, Washington brothers—who each finished 23rd in the PRCA world standings with \$36,096.58 and missed a National Finals Rodeo qualification for the first time since 2012—are also coming off a win the week prior at the Gold Buckle Beer Tour Finale in Rapid City, South Dakota, worth \$7,779 each.

"We were just glad to have a rodeo," Brady, 36, said. "Nobody knew if they were going to have it or what it was going to pay. In our circuit, we only had three regular rodeos and three co-approved rodeos, and we had to win a check. We got a check at New Plymouth, Idaho, and Redmond, Oregon, and we were just hoping to get a shot at Kissimmee."

The Minors won the first round with a 4.2-second run, worth \$1,241 each, and they won second in the second round with a 4.8-second run worth \$931. Their first-place checks for their aggregate time of 9.0 seconds on two head were for \$1,862 each.

"I was thinking to be aggressive and the fastest time got to go last on the second day," Riley, 32, said. "(Jeff) Flenniken and Garrett Rogers were ahead of me in the circuit, so I wanted to beat them in the first round, and I'd know what I had to do on the second one. That worked out luckily, and I had to be 6.3 to beat Garrett. He beat us by like \$300 for the three or six rodeos total for the year end."

Brady guesses he and his brother have won their Circuit Finals or year end four or five times, with Brady qualifying every year since 2004 and Riley making it each year since 2007.

"I contemplated unofficial-ing the rodeo because I

didn't know if it would pay \$400-\$500," Brady said. "But evidently the PRCA had a fund, and it was only two head so the money wasn't split up as much. There were 12 checks instead of 16. We know what Kissimmee pays, and we haven't won good there yet but I know the possibility of it. It was a real big deal for us to win the average there and get a chance at \$20,000 next April."

Because of the rodeos' significance for the 2021 season—as the money counts for next year's PRCA world standings and the RNCFR pays so well, too—both brothers opted to ride their NFR mounts, RK Tuff Trinket (Bob) for Riley and Leos Highbrow (Sug) for Brady.

"If Bob is there, I'm riding him," Riley said. "Even though it wasn't going to pay good, if we made it to Florida it was worth it, especially on a year when we haven't made much money I'll ride him every time I can. I think I rode him at all of the 40-or-so rodeos we went to."

"Sug's 15 and he acts like he's 8," Brady said. "I don't know if I feed him too good or what, but he acts as fresh today as the day I bought him, which is a good sign."

Brady and his wife Ashley just had their second child—a girl, Mesa Jeanne—August 15, and Riley and wife Jordan are expecting another little girl in November. Both families will plan to winter in Wittman, Arizona, and hit the road together again in 2021.

REED AND SHAWNEGO TAKE CALIFORNIA CIRCUIT FINALS

Ryan Reed and Joseph Shawnego won the 2020 California Circuit Finals Rodeo in Red Bluff, California, Oct. 9–10, 2020.



A couple of cowboy horseshoers from the original Cowboy Capital of the World in Oakdale took the team roping title at the 2020 California Circuit Finals Rodeo, which was held Oct. 9–10, 2020, in Red Bluff. Ryan Reed and Joseph Shawnego were 6.1 and 6.2 to edge reserve average champs and 2020 California Circuit Year-End Team Roping Champions Pat Boyle and Jared Hixon by 0.6 seconds on two steers.

"It was cool to finally win the circuit finals," said Reed, 28, who won California Circuit year-end championships with Shawnego in 2014, and roping with Tanner Luttrell and Dalton Pearce in 2016. "This was my seventh year being there, and I've been high call three times—with Joseph at my very first circuit finals, and with Monty Joe Petska a couple years ago, when we had all day to win it and I missed."

Reed and his fianc e, Kristy Monschein, welcomed a baby boy—Colter Curtis—to their family on Sept. 11. In addition to shoeing horses and riding outside horses and his own—he and Kristy have 19 head—Reed also works part time helping out with the Monschein family business.

It was Shawnego's second California Circuit Finals win, to add to his pair of circuit finals year-end team roping titles first won with Reed in 2014, then heeling for Blake Hirdes in 2015. In 2017, Shawnego won the California Circuit Finals roping with Cody Mora.

"The coolest part of this win, for me, is that I'm a little bit older now, and a lot of the guys I'm competing against are half my age or close to it," said Shawnego, 40. "And given the fact that it's been a trying year, it was just nice to get to come up here, compete and have some normalcy."

Reed considers his 2016 Pendleton Round-Up win with Pearce his career highlight to date. Shawnego's won rodeos like Redding, California, and Lewiston, Idaho, and rounds at the Reno Rodeo, but it's a day at The Daddy that tops his favorite hits list.

"I think my most memorable was when I roped with Doyle Gellerman my rookie year, in 2001, and we won the second round at Cheyenne that first year they had team roping. If I had to take a trip down memory lane, that's a favorite rodeo day to look back on. I was a 20-something-year-old kid roping with a guy I grew up watching on TV, so that was pretty special."

They won the 2020 California Circuit Finals with horse help from Reed's Burnt Wood and Shawnego's Rosie, and are now 2021 RAM National Circuit Finals Rodeo bound this spring in Kissimmee, Florida.

"I'm a huge Epcot Center fan," said Shawnego, who goes way back with Reed, and even helped him fill his permit. "I know my way around there now, so I get to maximize my experience. It's wonderful, and it'll be fun to get to go back."

Now that he's a family man, Reed's trip to the RNCFR will be from a new point of view.

"I always wanted to be a Top 15 header," he said. "There for a second, I thought I was one. But I made a full transition last winter. I sold a lot of my horses, and bought some property in Arizona. We got engaged, then found out we were going to have Colter. I don't plan on rodeoing hard anymore. It was kind of nice when I won this one to have a family to get home to. My perspective has changed tremendously."

Every contestant there thanked the California Circuit rodeo committees who made this year's finals possible. Big thanks to the Red Bluff Round-Up, Brawley Cattle Call Rodeo, California Rodeo Salinas, Clovis Rodeo, Empire Rodeo, Industry Hills Charity Pro Rodeo, Poway Rodeo, Rancho Mission Viejo Rodeo, San Bernardino Sheriff's Rodeo, San Dimas Charity Pro Rodeo, Santa Barbara Old Spanish Days Rodeo and Santa Maria Elks Rodeo. ■

WHITE BROTHERS ACHIEVE BIG GOAL IN BADLANDS CIRCUIT

Nebraska brothers Cooper and Tucker White won both the year-end and the average, and Cooper's heading mount took home 2020 Head Horse of the Year in the Badlands Circuit.



After falling short the last few years, Hershey, Nebraska's Cooper (23) and Tucker (27) White took home the Badlands Circuit year-end titles with a total of \$18,043.91 and \$15,595.21 in season earnings, respectively.

"It's something that we've worked for for a long time together," Cooper said. "We had the year-end won before we ran our last steer, but it was just cool to cap it off, and to do it with your brother is even cooler because you know how much you both rely on each other."

"The performances and everything counting put us in a good spot for the next year and getting into some other rodeos, possibly," Tucker added. "The performances at Kissimmee also count for the standings, so we're really excited about that. We've never been and we're on uncharted waters for me and my brother, both. We went in there winning it, but it was a tough year to win money in our circuit with 100-and-some entries everywhere you went. It was like making a SportsCenter top 10 play to place anywhere."

Cooper and Tucker clinched the circuit finals, held the weekend of Oct. 9–11, 2020, after turning in a time of 16.4 seconds on three head, worth \$2,112 each. They won the first round with a 5.7-second run, worth \$1,408 a man, placing second in the second round with a 5.1-second round worth \$1,056 a man, and placed second in the third round with a 5.6-second run, worth \$1,056 a man.

"We got to go last every round," Tucker said. "We won the second round and then we ended up leading the average, so we got to go last on the last one. It wasn't like it was that terribly tough—we were just able to go out and make our run and it was fast enough to win something, and it won good money."

You don't typically hear of team ropers setting their arena up with the dimensions of their circuit finals—that's generally reserved for ropers getting ready for the NFR—but the White brothers were determined.

"We have another arena that runs across my arena kind of like Patrick Smith's," Cooper said. "I wanted to get a feel before I got up there. We roped in it for about a week. When we started, I was reaching ... but then I was watching old films and Erich Rogers and the guys that do so good in the little buildings, they get them on a tight rope. I started trying to do that a little bit more and our runs were better, faster. From that day on, I said that I wasn't reaching."

Not only did they capitalize their year with the year-end titles and the average win after the long nights of practice, Cooper's head horse, Razor, owned by the White's family-friend, Andy Miller, was awarded the Badlands Circuit Head Horse of the Year.

"He's one of the best that I've ever rode, but he was still pretty young," Cooper said. "Most horses that I get are already finished, so I got to kind of help finish this one a little bit. I knew he was good, but I didn't know that the guys thought that about him. Andy said, 'I knew he'd win it. I got the watch the videos all summer and I knew he'd win it.' I didn't know. I was super happy, and I know Andy was very pleased, as well."

"We both know that we wouldn't have done any good without that head horse," Tucker noted.

Tucker heeled on his gritty, 16-year-old gelding, Gator.

"I wouldn't want to compare him to the likes of Jackyl because I think Jackyl is one of the best heel horses ever, but I've heard people say that he's always in the right spot at the right time and that's kind of how my horse is," Tucker said. "He's not the fastest, and he's not the best looking, but he always seems to be at the right spot at the right time for me to win something."

Cooper and Tucker are now leading the

2021 PRCA world standings with \$5,632.16 in earnings.

"There's so many opportunities that can come from the circuit finals," Tucker said. "If it was a normal year and you won the circuit finals, then you got into Fort Worth and you qualified for Kissimmee. For us, we had such a good finals that it's maybe letting us into Houston and San Antonio. Crazy opportunities come from just your circuit finals."

WARD AND HAWKINS WIN 2020 PRAIRIE CIRCUIT TITLE

Andrew Ward and Buddy Hawkins II clinch the 2020 Prairie Circuit year-end titles.



Andrew Ward and Buddy Hawkins did their 2021 rodeo season a big, fat favor by becoming the 2020 Prairie Circuit Team Roping Titlists. All circuit year-end and circuit finals champs advance to next spring's RAM National Circuit Finals Rodeo in Kissimmee, Florida, which in 2021, counts toward the world standings.

"We're really grateful that Kissimmee's come on board and spiced the national circuit finals up," said Hawkins, who currently hangs his hat in Stephenville, Texas, but still considers Columbus, Kansas, home. "Drew (Horner, with whom Hawkins qualified for his first NFR in 2013) and I won the RNCFR the first year it moved to Florida (in 2015), and it's right up there with Houston on payoff and prize line.

"The RNCFR, in general, is a great experience, and having it count toward the world standings is huge. If I'm doing the math right, they're paying 32 checks to 24 teams. And they usually have an even set of steers. When you look at trying to qualify for the National Finals, the sort of opportunity offered by the National Circuit Finals is absolutely crucial."

The Prairie Circuit Finals Rodeo was held Oct. 16–17, 2020, at the Stephens County Expo Center in Duncan, Oklahoma. Ward and Hawkins were 5.9 in Round 1, which finished two holes out of the money. Their 4.9 in Round 2 was one out in fifth place. But their two-run total of 10.8 seconds was good for fourth-place paychecks of \$632 per man in the average.

Prairie Circuit Finals champs, Jake Clay and

Brye Crites, who were 9.1 on two steers, will also head to Kissimmee. Clay and Crites won the opening round in 4.7, placed third in Round 2 with a 4.4-second run and, all told, earned \$5,056 a man toward the 2021 world standings.

Ward and his wife, Hayli, live in Edmond, Oklahoma. Hawkins, who's married to Hayli's sister, Tori, definitely does not see roping with a family member as extra pressure.

"To me, it's like a dream," Hawkins said. "Tori and Hayli pull as much weight as we do, and we're all doing what we love."

Asked to compare his three NFR qualifications, Hawkins likes to keep looking forward.

"Billie Jack Saebens asked J.D. Yates one time about his favorite win," Hawkins said. "He said, 'The next one is my favorite win.' That, to me, is how we all need to be looking at it.

"I tried to do every single thing I'd ever heard of anyone doing to get ready for my first Finals, and I felt like I probably didn't perform my best because I'd zeroed in on a tiny target. At my last Finals, I never really felt like we got tapped off. We never made two similar runs. It was like every night was a fresh rodeo.

"This summer, we went a long time where we got out of the barrier and caught every cow. This was as tough a summer as there's been but, in the end, you need to catch to have a chance to win. The way we see it, the first 100 pounds is his, the last 100 pounds is mine, and there should be a couple hundred pounds between my rope and his rope. It's that simple."

Garrett Tonozzi and Cullen Teller team up at Mountain States Circuit Finals and qualify for RAM National Circuit Finals on Oct. 23–24, 2020.

Colorado's Garrett Tonozzi, a two-time Wrangler NFR qualifier, and Cullen Teller, who won the Mountain States circuit on 2015 heeling for Clayton Van Aken, won the year-end title in the Mountain States Circuit.

Tonozzi and Teller finished out the year with \$11,254.10 and \$9,325.77 in total season earnings, respectively.

"It feels very good, actually," Teller said. "With five years in between, that's a long time. But, hard work pays off eventually. I'm excited to go wherever they're having it at. Next year, the RAM Finals counts for the world standings, so it's good to get into it this year."

Tonozzi headed for Dustin Davis in the 2020 ProRodeo season, while Teller started out the season heeling for Montana's Brady Tryan, then teamed up with Colorado young-gun Bryton Scheller for circuit rodeos, and finished out the year with Rhett Anderson.

"He was winning the circuit and so was I," Teller said. "Garrett is the best run—a great run. I actually got lucky enough to rope with him. It was decent considering everything that was going on. I finished 35th in the world. So, considering everything that was going on, it was alright."

Teller rode a 9-year-old sorrel mare named Lollipop, and a 15-year-old mare named Swayzi.

"I've rode Lolliop since she was 2," Teller said. "I got Swayzi from Mark Scheller this summer, right before the BFI. I rode Sawyzi at the circuit finals. Lollipop had pneumonia really bad. She is just trying to get better. I was planning on riding her and, right at the end of the summer, she got pneumonia, so I've been treating that. She's going to live, though. She's stuck with me for the rest of her life."

DECADE AFTER DECADE: **SMITH** SECURES FIRST FRONTIER CIRCUIT TITLE WITH BROWN

Chuck Smith and Kevin Brown took home the First Frontier Circuit Year-End Titles with \$8,046.35 in total season earnings on Oct. 23 – Oct. 25, 2020.



Chuck Smith, 53, has now won the First Frontier Circuit five times, once in each decade since he was in his early teens. This year, he and longtime friend and heeler Kevin Brown took home the year-end circuit title after accumulating \$8,046.35 in total season earnings.

"I've won it, I think, five or six times," Smith noted. "We were talking about it the other day, and I think I've won it every decade since I've been born. I won one when I was in high school in '85 or '86, somewhere right in there. I won at least one in my teens, my 20's, my 30's."

After an uncertain ProRodeo season, Smith notes that it was still a good year to be rodeoing, despite the challenges.

"Cowtown was able to put on rodeos all the way from July until the end of September, every week," Smith said. "They kept it under control. There was a handful of guys coming from out West, coming in on Saturday nights and competing. It was a little bit more challenging. It didn't seem like the same old place where you just showed up and left. It's kind of boring, but at least it was some place for us to go."

Smith, who lives in Townsend, Delaware, and Brown, who resides in Keedysville, Maryland, added \$3,648 to each of their earnings from the First Frontier Circuit Finals Rodeo in Harrington, Delaware, where they won the second round with a 6.7-second run, placed third in the third round with a 9.5-second run, and placed third in the average with a time of 16.2 seconds on two head.

"I've got to commend the circuit board for putting it on," Smith said. "It had to be very tough. My dad (Smokey Smith) was president of the circuit for quite a few years, and I know how hard it was on a regular year because I used to hear all the phone calls and the hours and hours it took to go look at places. We've been very fortunate to have Harrisburg, our finals, here for the past 10 or 15 years. The finals this year was in my home state, so I didn't have to go very far at all."

Smith headed on his 13-year-old head horse, Eddy, to help him secure the First Frontier Circuit heading title.

"I bought him off a friend of my dad's and he was a ranch horse in Missouri. He raised him and I bought him off the ranch and finished him. I've been on him for probably eight years now. He's just honest. He's nothing special. He just gives me 100% every time."

BACK-TO-BACK: **KESLER AND SIDDOWAY** TAKE TOP HONORS IN WILDERNESS CIRCUIT

Quin Kesler and Colby Siddoway secured No.1 in the Wilderness Circuit after coming off a strong finals on Nov. 6–7, 2020.

Utah's Quin Kesler, a two-time Wrangler NFR qualifier, and Colby Siddoway finished out their 2020 ProRodeo season in the No. 1 spot of the Wilderness Circuit standings to make the back-to-back circuit champions, qualifying them to the RAM National Circuit Finals in 2021.

"It was just kind of up in the air with having a game plan to get put together," Siddoway noted. "Once all of that stuff hit, we went to Cody (Wyoming) and all of those good rodeos over the fourth and didn't have any luck. We figured that we'd just stay home and go to a few circuit rodeos. It was hard to put a game plan together. We just stayed close to home."

Kesler and Siddoway showed up at the Wilderness Circuit Finals Rodeo in Herber City, Utah, in the No. 2 position with a handful of teams competing within a \$1,000-spread. But as fate would have it, Kesler and Siddoway won the first round with a 5.3-second run, worth \$1,222 each, placed second in the second round with a 5.5-second run, worth \$917 a man, placed second in the third round with a 5.4-second run, worth \$917 a man and took home the average title with a total time of 16.2 seconds on three head, adding \$1,833 to each of their earnings.

"We practiced a lot and tried to make sure that we were prepared," Siddoway said. "Quin just does such a great job over there. Last year he spun all three of them to win all three rounds, and I roped a leg on the last one. It was just like the same, identical spins, the same type of steers and I just had to get them caught pretty much—didn't have to rope to fast. I just made sure that I got to a good spot to catch them."

Siddoway was mounted out on a horse named Cody that the Kesler family raised and sold to Caleb Hendrix.

"He let me borrow him over there," Siddoway said. "That was the only place that I rode him. We were just practicing at Quin's and he kind of let me ride all of the good ones. That horse just seemed like the easiest one to catch on, so he got the call."

But Cody wasn't the mount that helped Siddoway qualify for the circuit finals. He rode the mare that Kesler made the NFR on.

"I rode one of Quin's horses that he made the finals on heeling a couple years ago," Siddoway said. "I pretty much rode her the last two years, while me and him were roping together."
